Peace is Every Step Silent Walking Meditation for Peace Multi-faith Event 21 January 12- 3pm

Collation of Peace Prayers offered by Faith Representatives

In a collaborative effort, diverse faith groups came together to organise and lead a silent contemplative Peace Walk in London. Organised in response to escalating violence and warfare worldwide, particularly as occurring in Palestine and Israel, the event advocated for peace amid the rising challenges of hatred, anger, destruction, displacement, suffering and increasing loss of life.

Facilitated by Plum Village UK and the Quakers in Britain, this initiative embodies a shared commitment to non-violence, reconciliation, justice and peace, reflecting the spiritual and ethical values of all spiritual Communities.

Introductory Words

Rehena Harilall, Plum Village UK,

On behalf of the co facilitating organising hosts, Plum Village Buddhist community, the Quakers in Britain and all the faith and peace organisations that have come together to co-create this space, welcome and thank you for your commitment to peace.

Each of you has come not just with your body but also the energy of many people before you. For us to be here today, going back 400 years, we each bring with us the energy of about 1 million ancestors . We also carry the energy for those who come after us. A bow to you.

I recognise that you may not all be able to hear me, as we are beautifully surprised by the number of people keen to be here and our sound system is limited. We humans have limitations because of our social, historical and cultural conditioning and local context. This may emerge in our speech and language, which may have the potential to cause harm, even unintentionally. For any harm our words may cause please accept our heartfelt apologies.

Today's event has emerged in response to escalating violence in over 30 wars and armed conflicts worldwide, exemplified in Palestine and Israel - the increasing destruction of life, starvation, displacement, lack of humanitarian aid, hostage taking, unjust detentions and the growing retaliatory violence and demonisation of others taking place right here as antisemitism and islamophobia grows.

It feels poignant to have this event commencing here in Trafalgar Square which since 1914 had been a place where advocates of peace have stood, long before us and I truly hope that generations that come may not need to continue to stand here.

You have responded to the heart call reflecting our *shared commitment to live in peace and harmony with others. Amidst the grief, pain, anger and loss we gather in solidarity to non-violence, reconciliation, and peace, reflecting the spiritual and ethical values of all spiritual Communities.*

As Judith Baker of the Quakers shares, " wars are a failure to cultivate and pursue peace and uphold the basic principles of ethical norms"

Today is a reminder, a call to heard that peace is not passive, it is not weak. Sustainable peace requires engaged action rooted in understanding, compassion, love and justice.

Our event walking/rolling together is our shared commitment to respect and cherish all life. Every human life is equally precious.

We walk/move in silence transcending religious and cultural boundaries, uniting all our common aspiration for a world built for and on peace. Our heartfelt aspiration requires no words. We stand together for humanity.

Our walking/moving together reflects the common interconnection we all have. The peaceful living those on opposing sides are intertwined with one another. Israel's peace is bound with that of Palestine and peace for Palestine is bound up in ours. What is happening there affects us here! What we do here affects others over there! So says Julie Siddiqi from the Together for Humanity Coalition.

Walking together reflects not only our engagement but also our interconnection. Making the white flower is tangible reminder that we all contribute our energy and our actions in cultivating a more peaceful world.

And as we move collectively, each of us like a wave in the ocean, from here to Parliament Sq moving through political landmarks, we weave the energy for peace.

For some of us this is personal honouring the energy of Zen Master Thich Nhat Hanh, Vietnamese Buddhist monk, peace activist who committed himself to engaging in the world working to bring about peace and reconciliation in the world through his art, his writings and his teachings. Thay (as he is known by his followers)as instrumental in advocating and acting for reconciliation and peace during the Vietnam/American War, was nominated by Martin Luther King for the Nobel Peace Prize, was invited by UNESCO to join the drafting of the 2000 Peace Manifesto charter and by the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) to draft a faith statement about climate change and our relationship to one another and to the Earth. In his memory we will remember his energy here in the Square where he led thousands in silent meditation so we continue his energy of peace through our steps. The title of this event "Peace is Every Step" is the title of one of his many books.

AJ Muste's words, "there is no way to peace, peace is the way," encapsulate the essence of this initiative, emphasising the personal and collective journey required by us all to nurture peace.

Peace is every step- every step is a commitment towards cultivating peace within ourselves, in our relationships and in the world around us.

Jewish Prayer Offering

Dear Fellow Walkers: in truth, I should stand here before you in silence, allowing the stillness and hush of the moment to hold us together as one humanity, one breath, descendants as our traditions teach, of one human being, created in the image of God. Human beings are not born with hatred in their hearts, but with the need for nurture and love, with a sense of wonder at the created world, with a yearning for harmony, beauty and peace.

War hurts our hearts; the suffering of innocent human beings scars our spirits. In the noisy, decimating, chaotic theatre of war, a war that is geographically far from us, but whose conflict is felt even here like the ground ruptures of an earthquake, we stand together to mourn and weep for the dead; we stand with those who are bereaved and broken, with children, women and men who have lost homes and livelihoods, who are beset by fear and trauma, who are without hope.

My prayer is addressed to the 'Eternal One, shelter of peace for all nations.' In Hebrew the word for God is not a noun, but a verb, coming from the word for 'to be.' In our Jewish tradition, we address our prayers to the source of our being, to the deepest parts of ourselves that some people call God:

Eternal God, shelter of peace for all nations, at this moment of unity and hope, we come together as one humanity to we pray for peace and mourn the deaths of all who have lost their lives, children, women and men. We ask You to give strength to all those who are bereaved and to console them with Your love and compassion. Heal broken hearts and bind up the wounds of those who are hurt; be with them in their pain and help them towards healing and recovery.

We pray for those who are still held hostage and for their release from captivity; for the thousands in Israel and Gaza who have been displaced from their homes. We associate ourselves with all those who live with trauma and anguish, with uncertainty and despair.

We pray for peace in the region, for the safe passage of humanitarian aid to all those who need it, for the wisdom and moral courage of world leaders, and for civility here in the UK and across the West, among those who may find themselves on opposite sides of this conflict. We stand together with all those who cherish a vision of freedom, justice and peace, who work for equality and understanding and seek to remove enmity and hatred. And we pray in the words of Torah:

Shalom, shalom la-rachok v'la-karov, amar Adonai – 'Peace, peace to the far and to the near, says the Eternal One.'

V'yiggal ka-mayyim mishpat,u'tzedakah k'nachal etan – 'Let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an everflowing stream.' And let us say: Amen.
